Orlando Brown



Orlando Brown was born at Trinity East on August 23rd, 1898 to William George Brown and Sarah Fowlow. He was a fisherman before enlisting in the Royal Newfoundland Regiment on April 29th, 1916. He was killed in action February 25th, 1917. He was 18.

Orlando embarked from St. John's on board S.S. Sicilian on July 7th, 1916 and joined C Company of the Regiment on October 22nd, 1916 near Guedecourt, France. Over the next four months he took part in intense trench warfare against the enemy. He was killed near Sally-Saillisel by enemy bombardment on February 25th, 1917. He has no known grave and is remembered on the Beaumont-Hamel Memorial, Beaumont-Hamel, France
